# THE FIRST AIRLINERS EXHIBIT REACHES ITS 25<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY

Mitchell Gallery of Flight Museum's "Zeppelin – The First Airliners," exhibit marked its 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this past November 18<sup>th</sup>, 2014. How time flies!

While making some minor maintenance repairs to the 1:36 scale model of the D-LZ 130 Graf Zeppelin II earlier this year, atop a 15 foot ladder, one of the MKE Airport's Maintenance Technicians asked me how long my model had been on display. I realized at that moment just how long my model had been hanging in the Mitchell Gallery of Flight Museum. Having my model on display here has truly been an honor for which I'm forever grateful. And while I'm thinking of this, a "special thanks" goes to my late friend Dick Wagner of Wag-Aero Co., who made space available where my model could be worked on in a hanger at Burlington Airport, and to Dick's team of skilled volunteers who helped assemble this model from its 3 sections into one, and with their assistance we completed

the model for display as it's seen today. As with any project of this scale, I couldn't have done this alone and the Plaque in the Zeppelin Display Case also gratefully acknowledges this fact.

Zeppelins became the first passenger carrying/paying airliners in the early 1900s, prior to WW1 and during that war, they served with the German Military as high altitude Bombers and Surveillance/ Scout Aircraft. While not completely successful as Bombers, they proved to be effective in their Surveillance/Scout role for the Kaiser's Navy. After the war, the Zeppelin Company re-established scheduled passenger service throughout Germany, which evolved in the late 1920s -1930s into 'aerial-globetrotting,' by the original D-LZ 127 Graf Zeppelin and then the Hindenburg. Following the accidental loss of the Hindenburg in 1937, another Zeppelin was completed, the D-LZ 130 Graf Zeppelin II which flew briefly prior to the outbreak of WW2, but never carried a paying passenger, the result of having to be flown inflated with hydrogen, as the US

Continued from page 3) would not sell Germany helium at that time. Both the 'original' Graf Zeppelin, and the D-LZ 130 Graf Zeppelin II, its replacement, were disassembled in May of 1940, their aluminum being used by the Germans to produce aircraft for their war effort. The D-LZ 130 Graf Zeppelin II was the last 'rigid airship' built by the Zeppelin Company.

Today, the Zeppelin Company (still in existence) has produced a new 'semi-rigid' Zeppelin airship, the NT-07, which has been flying since 2000, and is safely inflated with non-flammable helium. They have built several examples of this NT-07 design, and recently sold 3 derivatives of this design to Goodyear-Zeppelin Corporation to replace their current fleet of 'nonrigid' Blimps for commercial use here in the United States. The first of these new Goodyear-Zeppelins was 'christened' in the Fall of 2014. A scale model of the Zeppelin NT-07 hangs in the display case, 'Zeppelin, The First Airliners,' in the Mitchell Gallery of Flight Museum along with models of the 'original' D-LZ 127 Graf Zeppelin, a Balloon, and a Maybach Zeppelin Automobile. Historic airship artifacts and images of the great Zeppelins are also provided in the display case.

- 11. If you're a purist, do this two nights in a row.




